## It's Your Turn

About two years ago we collected \$100 from you for every lakefront property on Cedar Lake to allow us to develop a Watershed Management Plan that addresses all of the problems interfering with our use, enjoyment, and the proper management of Cedar Lake, its watershed, and other surrounding lands which have a direct effect on the lake.

\$70,000 of what you contributed for this task was paid to Kieser & Associates to facilitate this two year process. They guided us through the pre-defined process of the plan development, did much of the work required to facilitate the plan's development and in the end they will produce a plan that meets the requirements of the MDEQ and receives their approval. K&A also contributed many, many hours of "in kind" (no charge) effort, working with us as partners above and beyond the defined terms of the contract in this effort.

A steering committee made up of key players in the community was formed with volunteers who, from the start, committed to this long process to work through the issues, problems and solutions. The goal was to, in the end, reach a consensus on the definition of what are the important uses of the lake, what are the issues that interfere with or prevent those uses, and finally, and most importantly, to define solutions to the identified problems.

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## **Public Feedback: Cedar Lake Watershed Management Plan Summary**

The article below is a summary of the draft Cedar Lake Watershed Management Plan (WMP) Executive Summary. A complete version of the WMP will be submitted to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and Environment (DNRE) in March for their approval. Public input is a very important part of this planning process. After reviewing the summary, please take the time to fill out the feedback form included in this newsletter. Information in the WMP will be used to justify and direct future action in the watershed. The form asks for input on the watershed goals, objectives, and recommended strategies. Please provide feedback on ideas and/or concerns that you have with the goals, objectives, and approaches or projects. Feedback should be mailed using the provided envelop by the end of February so public feedback can be incorporated into the final WMP before it is submitted to DNRE at the beginning of March.

Please note that this is a *summary* of the WMP; additional supporting materials and detailed information will appear in the final version. The recommendations of the draft WMP were developed through an iterative process whereby technical input was solicited by the Steering Committee to determine the final approaches and recommended projects. The complete WMP will describe how the committee arrived at their conclusions and how the recommendations will help to achieve watershed goals and objectives. ## **Executive Summary: Cedar Lake Watershed Management Plan**

A comprehensive WMP represents a framework where watershed needs and solutions are identified to preserve, protect or restore water and natural resources around Cedar Lake. The WMP is not a regulation, ordinance or law, but rather serves as a template for justifying and developing such controls that may be needed. For many of the issues in the watershed, the WMP does not recommend regulatory action, but identifies voluntary efforts that the Lake Board and other interested groups should pursue. The Executive Summary of the Cedar Lake WMP plan is presented in this newsletter to provide information to the public about these recommendations in the WMP. Once approved, the complete WMP will serve as a road map for achieving community goals for sustaining Cedar Lake and its watershed. The WMP will: 1) provide background on the watershed and its resources; 2) include a synopsis of designated and desired uses in the watershed; 3) identify watershed concerns and threats; 4) define goals and major objectives; and 5) recommend potential approaches and projects for protection and restoration. The WMP also identifies and prioritizes the necessary approaches and improvement projects in the watershed, based on timing and funding considerations.

The WMP describes the areas within the watershed that are more crucial, or “critical areas” where protection and restoration actions should be prioritized. Critical areas in the watershed for protection include a) wetlands in the northwest where surface and groundwater feed Cedar Lake, and b) the lake in terms of water quality and habitat. The current developed areas around the lake were identified as critical for reducing future impacts from nutrient additions by implementing better lawn and septic system maintenance practices. The last critical area is Lakewood Shores to the southeast of Cedar Lake. Management of this area in a way that minimizes additional groundwater diversions from Cedar is critical for sustaining lake levels. The watershed goals identified in the WMP were developed by systematically integrating the watershed threats and concerns, desired uses in the watershed, and these critical areas.

The goals of the WMP include:

1. Restore the warmwater fishery to support healthy populations of native fish species
2. Maintain balanced and healthy aquatic plant and wildlife communities in lake and watershed
3. Maintain open and clear waterways in Cedar Lake for recreation
4. Preserve good water quality and reduce and/or minimize muck sediments to ensure recreational opportunities
5. Protect groundwater levels for lake recharge to achieve balanced lake levels
6. Maintain the legal lake level by protecting recharge sources and surface water inputs
7. Conserve and restore wetland and aquatic habitat for valuable ecosystem functions that benefit all watershed stakeholders

The final output of the WMP is an implementation strategy that the Lake Board will pursue over time. The strategy includes objectives with recommended approaches and projects for the lake and watershed. Each of the watershed objectives (1-9) listed below were drafted with the purpose to meet the overall goals set for the watershed. These objectives were systematically developed in response to watershed concerns that the Steering Committee and AICLA members identified in meetings. The complete WMP includes specific steps, milestones, and potential costs for each of the recommended approaches and projects.

**Objective I: Protect critical wetlands northwest of Cedar Lake from drainage or diversion**

- Support and work to implement wetlands protection ordinance.
- Restore creek flows and natural water storage capacity for slow release to lake over spring and early summer months (these items are being examined in the current augmentation pilot project).
- Acquire and protect wetlands in the northwest for a publicly accessible wetlands preserve.

**Objective II: Prevent additional groundwater loss from the southeast side of the lake from storm sewer drainage expansion**

- Support and work to implement wetlands protection ordinance to minimize further hydraulic impacts in wetland areas.
- Hold meetings with the county building inspector (and state regulatory agency, as needed) to ensure residential building codes are enforced and buildings are constructed in areas above high groundwater mark to avoid future complaints of flooded homes.
- Modify Lakewood Shores Property Owners Association (LSPOA) Architectural Standards to ensure homes are built above high groundwater mark (to avoid flooding issues which could increase the need for more groundwater drainage).
- Hold workshops to educate homeowners and potential builders on practices or measures that will reduce the risk of flooding in homes.

**Objective II: Improve sport fishery in lake through enhanced lake levels, creek flows, and wetland protection**

- Protect and enhance hydrology of northwest wetlands (particularly near creeks) for pike spawning in the spring (being examined in the current augmentation pilot project).
- Protect surrounding wetlands through ordinance, conservation easements, and/or land acquisition.
- Pursue and fund annual recommendations of the fishery management studies and reports through Lake Board contracts.
- State stocking of walleye fingerlings on an “as needed” basis until a self-sustaining population can be established.

**Objective IV: Complete an augmentation feasibility study to chose a suite of lake level management options for implementation**

- Conduct public hearing and informational sessions to gain taxpayer support and pass assessment to fund lake management study (already completed).
- Fund and implement lake level management projects to augment summer lake levels (during dry years).

**Objective V: Control existing invasive species and prevent new invasive species and excessive aquatic plants from entering the Cedar Lake watershed**

- Educate residents and lake users on best management practices and other ways to prevent invasive species from entering the watershed.
- Create a homeowner’s guide for Cedar Lake to educate riparians on current and potential invasive species near Cedar Lake.
- Continue involvement in MS&LA in order to gain further knowledge on new invasive species, prevention strategies, and treatment options.
- Create a boat launch cleaning station to reduce the risk of invasive species transmission.
- Use an aquatic plant management plan and fishery studies to monitor and/or control invasive species and further develop contract from Lake Board for a “lake manager”.

- Track reports from lake manager on changes in the aquatic plant community and determine appropriate means for control (potential to change spillway to a control water structure).

**Objective VI: Take steps to improve composition of lake bottom sediments**

- Fund sediment thickness study and mapping to determine accumulation rate in Cedar Lake.
- Use study results to determine dredging feasibility, priority areas, and potential costs.
- Add lawn best practice information to workshops/educational programs to help prevent unnecessary leaf and grass disposal to Cedar Lake; add to the Lake Stewards Program.

**Objective VII: Educate lakeshore residents about natural lakescaping methods/green buffers**

- Educate residents on lakescaping benefits and techniques to encourage shoreline stabilization and natural habitat which also deter nuisance waterfowl.
- Partner with LSPOA and lakefront owners to implement a native buffer demonstration site in a highly visible area around the lake.
- Incorporate lakescaping into Lake Stewards Program and hold tours each year to showcase lakescaping site, encourage native plant exchange or sale, and to supplement educational workshops.

**Objective VIII: Continue monitoring water quality parameters and *E. coli* levels to protect water quality and recreational value**

- Further develop an *E. coli* sampling plan and confirm quality control of current testing program.
- Participate in ML&SA annual conference and the CLMP to monitor water quality conditions and obtain new lake management information
- Educate lake residents on proper septic system maintenance, proper lawn care practices, and nutrient reduction practices; incorporate into Lake Stewards Program.

**Objective IX: Utilize conservation easement options to protect habitat**

- Work with land conservancies to provide technical resources and assistance to obtain voluntary conservation easements from property owners to protect habitat and conserve green space.
- Obtain funding and engage with interested land owners on purchasing important parcels of land in the northwest wetlands near creeks.

## You must successfully complete a snowmobile safety course if you are:

A person who is at least 12 but less than 17 years of age operating a snowmobile without direct supervision of a person 21 years of age or older must have in their immediate possession a valid snowmobile safety certificate. A person who is at least 12 but less than 17 years of age may not cross a highway or street without having a valid snowmobile safety certificate in their immediate possession.

Snowmobile safety training is recommended for all snowmobile operators. Modern snowmobiles are capable of high rates of speeds over snow and ice. With the countless hazards associated with operating a snowmobile, training is a crucial factor in safe and responsible snowmobile operation.

Michigan Conservation Officers, in cooperation with schools, organizations and associations, take an active role in assuring that all of Michigan's citizens are given the opportunity to take a snowmobile safety course. The course emphasizes safe and responsible snowmobile operation.

## SNOWMOBILES AND ICE

The safest snowmobiling rule is to never cross lakes or rivers since it can never be guaranteed that ice of any thickness will support a snowmobile. Ice is always dangerous. Do not venture out onto lakes or rivers unless you are absolutely certain that it is safe.

Besides the danger of plunging through the ice, you have far less traction for starting, turning, and stopping on ice than on snow. Always use extreme caution when riding on ice. Always travel at low speeds. The machine is hard to control on ice, so fast stops are impossible and spins are far too common. To stop, let up on the throttle slowly allowing the machine to coast to a stop. Controlling your machine is best when seated.

Collisions on lakes account for a significant number of accidents because riders too often believe that lakes are flat, wide open areas, free of obstructions. Remember, if you can ride and turn in any direction while operating on a lake, so can other riders. Therefore, the threat of a collision can come from any direction.

If you choose to snowmobile on the ice, be absolutely certain that the ice is safely frozen. Don't trust the judgment of other snowmobilers. You are responsible for your own safe snowmobiling. Drowning is a leading cause of snowmobile fatalities. If you ride on ice often, consider wearing a buoyant flotation snowmobile suit. It is also a good idea to have a set of commercial ice picks, with spring-loaded sleeves that cover the points, attached to a cord so they can be threaded through the sleeves of your snowmobile suit.

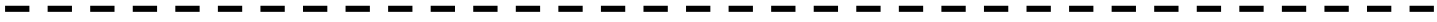
If you go through the ice, stay calm. Remember that your snowmobile suit (even a non-buoyant one) and helmet may keep you afloat for several minutes. Extend your arms out forward in front of you on the unbroken ice surface to catch yourself. Kick your feet to propel you onto the ice, like a seal. If the ice keeps breaking, continue moving toward shore or the direction from which you came. Use anything sharp, like ice picks, keys or a knife to dig into the ice to help pull you forward. Don't remove your gloves or mitts. Once you are on the ice, crawl or roll away from the hole. Don't stand up until you are well away from the hole.
